Volcanoes

There are two major types of volcanoes: shield and composite. Shield volcanoes are formed from lava that is runny and can move easily. The lava flows quickly and smoothly out of the volcano, forming gentle slopes that start out as 2 to 3 degrees at the base and increase to only 10 degrees at the summit. Many of them erupt almost continuously so the structure of the volcano can grow to become very large. One example of a shield volcano is Mauna Loa in Hawaii, the largest volcano on Earth. It is 100 kilometers wide at its base and reaches a height of over 9 kilometers from the sea floor which, if the undersea part of the volcano is included, makes it higher than Mount Everest.

However, the largest shield volcano known is not on earth, but on Mars. Olympus Mons was measured at 21.9 kilometers, two and a half times taller than Mount Everest, and is currently the tallest shield volcano known in the solar system. Shield volcanoes form on the boundaries of divergent tectonic plates, plates that are moving away from each other. They can also form from plumes of magma rising from the center of the earth. As the plate moves over the plume, new volcanoes are formed while the older ones become dormant as they slowly move away. This is what is happening with the Hawaiian Islands - a long line of islands along the path of a moving magma plume.

Composite volcanoes, also known as stratovolcanoes, are quite different. Their lava is viscous, making it thicker than **that** of shield volcanoes, and therefore is much slower. This allows composite volcanoes to form steep-sided mountains with a crater on the top, reflecting the traditional picture of a volcano. The largest such volcano on earth by height is Ojos Del Salado in Chile, standing at nearly 6.9 kilometers above sea level.

Occasionally the crater at the top of a composite volcano collapses and forms a caldera, a large depression created when all the lava has erupted from its underground chamber and there is no more left to support the crater. This can fill with water and form a lake within the remaining crater. Crater Lake in Oregon is a good example of this. Composite volcanoes tend to form on the boundaries of **convergent** plates where an oceanic plate is being pulled under a continental plate. Mount Pinatubo in the Philippines and Mount Fuji in Japan are classic examples of these.

Volcanoes are extremely dangerous. Most people associate them with explosions, ash, and pyroclastic bombs, huge globules of lava thrown out of the volcano, but these are attributes of composite rather than shield volcanoes. Because the lava of composite volcanoes is so sticky, pressure can build up resulting in violent explosions. This is what happened in the Mount St. Helens eruption in 1980 in the US. Another danger is scalding hot toxic ash spewing from a volcano at high speeds. The Vesuvius eruption in southern Italy which destroyed the Roman cities of Pompei and Herculaneum in the year 79 is an excellent, if tragic, example of this.

Shield volcanoes are equally dangerous, but not in the same way. Their danger lies in the speed the lava can move. In the 1950 eruption of Mauna Loa, the lava was recorded moving at 10 kilometers per hour which does not sound too dangerous. However, once the lava established channels, that speed increased to 60 kilometers per hour.

Telling the Bees

Sweden is obsessed with wood. Over 57% of the country is covered in an 51 billion trees and wood and paper products are one of the country's biggest . So it's not surprising that Swedish researchers have out a whole new use for all that wood; they've made it transparent.

Lars Berglund is a researcher at Sweden's Royal of Technology. After years of working with carbon fiber, a super strong but light material, in the Swedish aerospace industry, Berglund began to with wood. Ultimately, he has created what he calls a wood composite material.

Berglund's technique begins with thin sheets of wood. Using a similar to the way paper is made, he removes the lignin, a chemical which gives wood its brownish color, from the pieces. The lignin is then with a clear organic polymer.

The result is a one-millimeter thick material which is 85% transparent, and Berglund thinks he can increase this over time. It's also as biodegradable and as friendly as regular wood.

Berglund says that there is a lot of interest from who want to bring more light into their buildings in the future, this new material could be used as a stronger, environmentally-sustainable replacement for plastic or glass in walls, windows and solar panels.

Baklava is a popular dessert in Turkey, Iran, and the Middle East. It is not known exactly from where the dessert but is probably in Ancient Greece. Doctors Without Borders is an international charity which cares for people affected by man-made and natural disasters. This organization was in 1971 by a team of doctors and journalists during the civil war in Biafra in Nigeria. Their aim was to an independent organization that focused on providing assistance to people in emergency situations, anywhere in the world.

Initially, the organization had 300 , mainly qualified doctors and nurses. Today however, there are over 45,000 members of staff, including engineers, administrators, technicians, and specialists in water management. Staff need to be committed to work for the charity for at least two years. During this time employees have access to various types of training so that they can acquire the skills needed to work in challenging and stressful environments. Currently, the organization has projects in skills in over 70 countries throughout the world.
